

LESSON PLAN: BEAUTY'S PRIVILEGE

Title: Upcycled Garment or Art Work

Grades: 9 through 12

Medium: Mixed media, found objects, recycled materials

OVERVIEW:

"Upcycling" is the process of converting waste materials or useless products into new materials or products of better quality or a higher environmental value. In this lesson students will explore the various possibilities involved using recycled materials to create garments and accessories to aid them to view discarded objects in a different light.



OBJECTIVE:

Help students to become more environmentally aware by transforming recycled waste materials (or otherwise useless products), that might end up in a landfill, into a wearable garment or accessory. Enable students to explore the possibilities of a career in the arts. Dip into the emotional psyche to imbue the work with heart and soul.

MATERIALS:

- Found objects (odd bits of old jewelry, bottle tops, twisty ties, styrofoam containers, plastic bottles
 and bags, paper bags, coffee cups, copy paper waste, packing materials, bubble wrap, straws,
 aluminum cans, cardboard and plastic packaging, phone books, newspapers, old toys and dolls,
 metal, computer parts, clothes hangers, records, cds, unwanted greeting cards, letters and
 envelopes, discarded clothes, fabrics and shoes...)
- Assortment of Glue
- Scissors
- Hole Punch
- Wire
- String
- Tape
- Paint, brushes
- Pens, pencils
- Drill and drill bits

TEACHER PREPARATION:

- Instruct students to gather fodder for the project. Ask friends and family to donate unwanted goods, clothes and clean, recycled waste products.
- Prepare a lesson to assemble techniques: creating an armature from sculpture wire, wire wrapping, hand stitching, gluing or taping.

PROCEDURES:

- Divide students up into groups of two or more.
- Instruct students to research and find images of upcycled fashions and accessories.
- Demonstrate lesson on assembling techniques.
- Have students prepare a sketch of their design and include materials list and assemblage procedure.
- Allow students class time to build their creations.
- When complete, they then present their finished garment/ accessory, along with their preliminary sketches and plans.
- Have the students evaluate their plan and compare the plan and execution to the final product. Ask
 them to explain any modifications. Ask them to define where they were successful and how they
 could have improved their art work.



TEACHER TIPS:

- Show examples or pictures of garments made from recycled objects.
- Encourage students to make adjustable or one-size-fits all garments and accessories such as hats, scarves, ponchos and wrap around skirts.
- Advise students to use each other as models/ mannequins for fitting the garments.
- If feasible, it is helpful to use a dress makers dummy, head form or mannequin.

VARIATION:

Have the students work in pairs, one making a fashion item from a used art work, one making an art work from a used fashion item. It would be best if the works related together into a theme.
