In creating this piece for Barbara, I've used numerous strands of yarn to symbolize the many paths one treads in a lifetime. Their chaotic meanderings somehow create a discernable pattern. My model, Barbara has lived her life to the fullest. She is bubbly and outgoing, has a natural sense of caring for others, and a generous nature. She has a sense of adventure, following unexpected paths even at a late stage in life. Her courage has been rewarded, finding a new love whom she married at the age of 82. The antiseptic and disinfectant properties of silver have been known since Roman times. I have used sterling

silver hand knitted ribbon to remind us of the healing power of love and that many a silver lining has come out of a storm cloud. And finally the glass flowers, created in fire, their sparkling beauty, like champagne bubbles up from the background, have a fragility that belies their strength. We are reminded that all things worthy are to be earned.

The hat is made of red felt silk-screened with the character for "Great Idea" in blue and is stabilized with a blue felt. My seal of 'Beautiful Joy' representing my name and how I sign my Zen Paintings is also silk-screened into the felt.

The next three are for this intrepid woman's three marriages and the last two for her two children. Hildred was a seamstress known for her ability to match plaids and the base of the hat is a design of woven ribbons to reflect those skills. The ace of hearts is there to remind us that love life is a gamble but like the butterflies, Hildred, a ballroom dancer, was prepared to make a sampling. Finally the black and white palette symbol-

ized her world with great highs and lows like the dips and twirls of a tango.

In designing a hat for Dorothy, I took photos of her artwork and printed them onto vintage music sheets. I then made them into colorful paper flowers that I place around her hat. On the front of her hat I placed a miniature easel embellished with vintage jewelry just like the kind Dorothy wears. The easel holds a copy of one of Dorothy's paintings. I added paintbrushes with rhinestones to represent feathers and small tubes of overflowing paint. Holding

all these things in place is fluffy tea dyed tulle. It reminds me of how Dorothy is always pleasant, friendly and happy.

I decided to create a hat that would represent Bill's countrywide passion for hiking. I worked to evoke, in a poetic sense, the trails he has experienced. First I silk-screened felt to create a texture in ochre and terracotta. My foam print represents the white wash of a wave that I sewed into horizontal wavy seams to represent the earth in different strata of colors. The tassel in red hues adds the focal point, the fashion accent that represents Bob's courage and curiosity in the world. I knew it would please Bill because of his preference for the color red! He also has a strong and tall stature, so I made something elegant to match his verve for life. Bill and his wife Lois are a healthy couple. They are actively on the trail of life and it is a delight to get to know them better.
