- Recognize and celebrate existing visual art accomplishments by spotlighting local artists.
- Create an exciting event that facilitates cross-pollination between cultural organizations and strengthens and invigorates the San Diego Visual Art Scene.
- Broaden the audience of the visual arts in San Diego by gaining national attention to the competition through a dedicated media campaign.
- Promote the vision of the future role that the visual arts will play in the San Diego community as lively, thriving, positive and empowering.
- Expand the infrastructure of spokespeople/art celebrities who can bring awareness to San Diego and perform as role models for our student artists.

The Athenaeum's art exhibition program, begun in the 1920s, has grown tremendously in Exhibitions in the Joseph Clayes III Gallery focusing on nationally and internationally recognized artists. The Rotunda Gallery emphasizes community partnerships or emerging regional artists. The North Reading Room, opened during the library's expansion in 2007, is devoted to showcasing the Athenaeum's Erika and Fred Torri Artists' Books Collection.



Building a Bigger Audience for Art: Why the San Diego Art Prize Has Mattered

Art criticism is subjective and the best of it is subjective in an informed sense. Readers have a right to think that the person expressing an opinion about an artist's work knows a good deal about art history as well as contemporary work. Art lovers also have a right to expect those who award art prizes have constructed a considered view of the works they recognize.

Criticism and prizes, when they are persuasive, share another function: They focus our attention on deserving work. A sound piece of writing will, if it succeeds, probably persuade you to see the art being chronicled for yourself. So, too, can an award process, particularly when, as is the case with the San Diego Art Prize, the winners are given an exhibition as part of the recognition they receive.

With a long history to its name thus far, beginning with 2006-2007, the San Diego Art Prize has existed long enough for us to form a view as to whether it has enriched the local scene and has focused attention on artists who deserve new or renewed attention. I contend that it has done both. The prize has redoubled our appreciation of established artists in our midst and directed it toward others with far less exposure.

Looking at the roster thus far suggests that it is individuality, the ability to realize a distinct vision, which has taken precedence over any particular style or school of work. In the process, the San Diego Art Prize has recognized an admirable cross-section of artists, from the first round (2006-2007) to the current one. Sure, those of us who have chronicled the art history of this region for many years, as I have, would want to add other artists to the list. But there isn't an artist who has been chosen to date who hasn't deserved to be on the list.

The prize has recognized a major figure like Eleanor Antin (in 2007-08), who has been widely recognized for her contribution to conceptual image making for four-plus decades. And it has singled out a preeminent local painter, Richard Allen Morris (in 2009), who worked in relative obscurity for decades and only received his international due in the last six or seven years.

Then, there is that marvelous dimension of the prize: each established artist gets to choose an emerging or lesser known artist -- in most cases with an eye toward exhibiting along with that artist. The selections for 2010, in this respect, affirm the virtue of this approach. Gail Roberts, a highly accomplished painter, has chosen David Adey, who has presented memorable exhibitions in the past two years of his craft punch pictures and sculptural installations. Einar and Jamex de la Torre, whose intricate, virtuosic sculptures caustically mix and mingle pop culture references with traditional Catholic iconography, have picked Julio Orozco, who takes the industrial refuse of Tijuana and turns it into elegant compositions with an undercurrent of commentary.


If you want to begin to understand the richness of art being made in San Diego and the nearby portions of Baja California, take a look at the complete list of San Diego Art Prize winners. After perusing it in the online exhibition catalog, seeing their art for yourself is the next step. If you are persuaded to do so, which seems likely, this prize will have served a great purpose: building an audience for noteworthy art being made in San Diego. Art criticism does the same, when it succeeds. They are different means to the same valuable end.

Rizzhel Mae Javier

Rizzhel Javier is an artist and educator from San Diego and the Founder of [BRIDGE](#). She is an advocate for arts education and is always looking for opportunities to bring visual arts into the community. Rizzhel uses photography in her personal work, which exist in sculptural forms, to make objects that explore memory, human interaction and relationships. She teaches photography with *The AjA Project*, with displaced children and incarcerated youth, and video at *Pacific Arts Movement* as Instructor for their Documentary Short Film program *Reel Voices*. Rizzhel Javier graduated college with a BFA from Humboldt University in 2007, received her MFA degree from San Diego State University in 2012 and she is an active member of the arts community in the region.

Cy Kuckenbaker

Cy Kuckenbaker is an experimental filmmaker and photographer who works with software; digital video; analog and digital photography; and the written word. He received his MFA in film direction from the California Institute of the Arts in 2006, was the recipient of a Fulbright Fellowship in 2004 and served for two years as a Peace Corps volunteer in Lithuania from 2000-2002. His experimental videos have been shared broadly online by platforms such as The Atlantic magazine, Designboom, Journal Du Design and more. Most recently his work was featured in *PhotoViz*, an artbook published by Gestalten, edited by Nicholas Felton, that featured cutting edge work in the area of photo visualization. The themes of Kuckenbaker's work vary but include American identity; time based narrative; bureaucracy and capitalism; and human vision. Cy Kuckenbaker is a full time faculty member at San Diego City College where he teaches film.

The Cardinal Directions is a photo and video series focused on his relationship to the city of San Diego and his need to orient himself within its narrative. Created with handmade stereo cameras that take hours to expose an image; the unpredictability of the cameras and the long exposure times demand meditation and invite randomness; a rebellion against the formalized, tourist oriented, narrative of the city.

To know Rizzhel, or Rizz as I call her, is to know pure talent. Whether creating her own images in the darkroom, leading a class of participants through Juvenile Court and Community Schools or working alongside budding teaching artists through her professional development workshops, Rizz exudes passion for the work. She understands, in the most holistic sense, the power of the arts to change lives and is committed to ensuring access to all youth.

Rizzhel Mae Javier (San Diego, 1983) is a San Diego based multidisciplinary artist, educator and also a cultural producer as the head of [BRIDGE](#), a project that promotes art in marginalized or vulnerable communities across Southern California.

Her background in sculpture is unavoidably evident in her playful interactive pieces, which present to the audience physical representations of memory and perception. It is interesting to notice that though she does not label herself or her body of work as border art, her geographical location and cultural background are noticeable in her artwork, by her carefully chosen and elegant use of language, her effortless shift across different mediums: photography, sculpture, cinema, or site-specific installation as well as the use of visual metaphors which can easily be associated with "border-art".¹

I think it is important to ask her audience to pay attention to their thoughts and reactions while experiencing her work, as her intention is to have us open up and talk about past situations that we normally store or even actively try to forget.

In a way, looking at her work is almost like looking into a mirror. If you ever have the opportunity to experience it, please keep in mind the following words of H.M. Tomlinson: 'We see things not as they are, but as we are ourselves.²

The Essential Image


The art of the past no longer exists as it once did. Its authority is lost. In its place there is a language of images. What matters now is who uses that language for what purpose. --John Berger

Cy Kuckenbaker is an artist whose images are central to understanding this new language of images. An award winning filmmaker, experimental video artist and photographer, he is as much an explorer as an artist in his pursuit of new ideas.

Photography and lens-based imagery, as we know it, is in a transformative moment – the technologies are undergoing many changes; photography itself is the central subject in contemporary art and contemporary art is at the forefront of the art world today. Kuckenbaker is an artist creating work that is part of redefining how lens-based media is perceived today.

It is important to take note of the strategies he utilizes in making his art. Manipulation is fundamental to the work he creates. Kuckenbaker embraces photographic technology, at the same time referencing precedents from the history of the medium. Great art does not ignore historical practice, but builds upon what has gone before. His influences in *The Cardinal Directions* series range from early stereo photography, non-silver process, to video. Creating a hybridization of technologies he also is integrating the notion of time and randomness in his work.

However, it is not the tools or technologies that define art, but the results--the ability of the artist to create. Cy Kuckenbaker is a true explorer, an adventurer embracing his medium. The tools—computer, camera, digital or analog—are just the means by which he makes his ideas a reality.



Alexander Kohnke

Alexander Kohnke's work observes and visualizes the underlying, raw forces of life in our everyday existence. Using a wide range of media and armed with a keen aesthetic and a sense of humor, Kohnke works in drawing, photography, printmaking and video to create work that is both personal and universal. He was born in Germany, lived in Belgium and Switzerland before moving to Los Angeles in 1994 and San Diego in 2014. He holds a BFA from Art Center College of Design, Pasadena. The art work of Alexander Kohnke has been shown in San Diego and L.A., most recently at a solo exhibition at Airlock Gallery in San Marcos.





Victoria Fu / Matt Rich

FU/RICH is a collaboration between artists Victoria Fu and Matt Rich. Fu works primarily in video and image-based installation, while Rich is a painter. Their collaborative practice is a coming together of aesthetic sensibilities and working processes, visible through the combined palettes and textures--from film-grained gradients and painted brushstrokes to frayed canvas threads. Fu (b. Santa Monica, CA) received her MFA from CalArts, MA in Art History/Museum Studies from USC, and BA from Stanford University; Rich (b. Boston, MA) received an MFA from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, a BA from Brown University. They met at Skowhegan in 2010, and embarked on this studio partnership for a solo exhibition at The Suburban, Milwaukee, WI, this past May. The show traveled to Angels Gate Cultural Center in San Pedro, CA, this past summer, and will travel to University of Massachusetts Boston, MA in March 2018. They live, work and teach in San Diego.

Notes by **Debra Poteet**, collector, nominator of **Alexander Kohnke**

I first saw the work of Alexander Kohnke some two years ago when he was part of the group show, "(Con)Text" at the San Diego Art Institute. What first appeared to be a simple series of small drawings of a man making unusual faces gained meaning, and indeed context, when I realized that the man was mouthing the letters of the alphabet. Over the next several months, I continued to run across Alex's work, and it never ceased to amaze me. Working in drawing, photography, printmaking and video, Alex combines humor, a unique vision and great technical skill to create works that are both thought provoking and universal.



Notes by **Hugh Davies, PhD**, Director Emeritus, Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego about **Alexander Kohnke**

Alex Kohnke greets me at the door of his Elfin Forest residence and studio with four rescue dogs. A rotund pug, a large, old white Doodle in cone, a feral short haired mutt who vigorously sniffs and licks everything that moves and a beautiful, long haired Black Sable German Shepherd who is the newest arrival. When all the jumping and licking subsides the artist states with a smile that, ". . . four rescue dogs is ideal but five would be hoarding."

Kohnke's use of various media to make his art is equally ecumenical to his dog collection. The studio and home host a most varied collection of drawings, photographs, prints, collages, paintings, sculpture and even video. Recently he's been recording and mixing found sounds to accompany a new video including footage of swarming bees from the nest he daringly removed from inside an upstairs bedroom. Everything is fair game for art and all media are enlisted.

Trained as a graphic designer in his native Germany and a graduate of Art Center in LA, he supports his art by designing extraordinarily beautiful, edgy and elegant books and exhibition catalogues. A prime example is the Xerographia catalogue he recently designed for the University of San Diego Art Galleries' contribution to the current Getty sponsored Los Angeles/Latin America exhibition series. Indeed, his grounding in the grid of design and the discipline of subtle adjustments in scale and color very positively informs his artistic sensibility.

To get to the work, I'll start with a black and white photograph he took with a medium format 6x9 camera of a field overgrown with invasive thistles - wonderfully evocative tall, tasseled stalks against the sky horizon. The field has since been plowed under and covered with cookie cutter, cheek by jowl houses — as he notes, ". . . another form of invasion." He then prints and separately frames two identical versions of the image covering one with a solid rectangle of gray paint across the center and the other with a larger rectangle of the same pigment but with its center - which is the same size as that on the first photograph — removed to reveal the part of the photograph he'd previously concealed. This pairing necessitates studying both framed images to see their common image - keeping the information in your head as you assemble them. It is a subtle but powerful way of guiding perception; conceptual hide and seek in a most compelling method.

Kohnke grew up a stutterer in Germany but discovered upon speaking English that he stutters much less. Saying, "you can't avoid it" he's currently making a 26 drawing alphabet of himself speaking each letter accompanied by its dot, Braille symbol. These unflinching and unsparing self-portraits will become the grist for a series of new art works. There is a poignant drawing on the studio wall which simply states, "I w-w-will n-n-not r-r-re-p-peat my-s-s-self."



Kohnke, raised a German Catholic, is married to Hillary, an American Jew, whom he met at Art Center. They have three truly exceptional children - Mikko, Rakel and Piet - whom I greatly envy growing up in that inspirational home. Shortly after they became serious about their relationship Alex and Hillary visited his family near Düsseldorf and made the painful but necessary visit to a concentration camp near Weimar. One of the most beautiful and mysterious works in their house is a pale green, photographic triptych made with a pin hole camera of their childhood stuffed animals. As Alex explains; "these toys contain so much love, love and purity — they don't know about history."

Notes by **Kate Clark** artist and film maker for **Victoria Fu / Matt Rich**

Artists Victoria Fu and Matt Rich play with the tropes and tricks of display, bending unbroken surfaces around corners, nesting planes within planes. As a video and installation artist, Fu explores the textures and divisions of analogue and screenal space. As a painter, Matt Rich develops revelations of hue that are abruptly cut by oblique forms. Alongside their independent practices, Fu and Rich have co-created 2-D painterly works that live comfortably within framed space. Yet their collaborative surfaces take on another dimension when cut from the cloth of a domestic realm: aprons. Printed on durable cotton, their aprons are designed to last, but for what practices? Fu and Rich's textural vocabularies layer on one printed surface, where film grain gradients are scudded with brush smears. Rich's whorls of paint, when printed at crotch height, waiver between a Warhol piss painting and a Hodgkins daub. Holed openings and extra strings yet again lead to questions about what applications these garments might be for. Hung from the walls as textiles, the inert aprons hint at a performance staged in our imaginations, where the human body becomes another plane that is only implied.

When the aprons were first revealed to me in person, we stood in hushed tones. Fu and Rich had recently developed another collaborative project: a baby. It was after bedtime, so we circled tightly around a cardboard box in the paint flecked entryway of their San Diego rambler. We kept our gasps of delight to a murmur while Matt pulled the aprons out one by one, revealing crescent, ovaline, and rhomboid shapes, each swatch carrying its own grammar of twilight color roll dreams, pocket blips, exclamation hem and paint tangles. We asked Matt to model the aprons, and so he put one on. A sunset stretched over his torso, lopping off to an opaque horizon, where two rows of centipede leg strings hung from the sides. We cinched the strings through Matt's legs and up around his waist, configuring a bib that extended into a diapered flourish. Standing amongst the blue, yellow and red splotches of scattered toddler shoes and the piles of crisp apron assemblages, it was clear that the realms of texture, color, domesticity, and formalism that Fu and Rich are exploring have surfaced from a multi-dimensional collaborative life.


